Sweet but with plenty of acidity. Needs a good summer to fully ripen. Heavy cropper. Makes a fabulous pie. Skin colour: Green to yellow, with scarlet flush.			
Type: Culinary Fruit size: Very large Picking time: Mid October Period of use: Mid Oct – March	3 Bramley's Seedling (Pollination group: BT). Cooking apple. Heavy crops of extra-large fruit with creamy white flesh and full of flavour. Skin colour: Yellowish green, lightly striped with red.			
Type: Cider/culinary Fruit size: Large Picking time: Dec - January Period of use: October	4 Camelot (Pollination group: B). Produces mild, bittersharp fruit that can also be cooked to a fruity gold puree, making it ideal for apple sauce. Disease resistant. Skin colour: Flushed & striped red.			
Type: Dessert Fruit size: Medium Picking time: October Period of use: October - December	5 Cox's Orange Pippin* (Pollination group: B). Skin colour: Greenish yellow with brownish flush.

Skin colour: Greenish-yellow, flushed and striped with red			
Type: Dessert Fruit size: Medium Picking time: Late September Period of use: October - March	2 Fiesta / Red Pippin (Pollination group: D). A crisp, juicy white flesh. Aromatic, nutty & sweet with a hint of Cox flavour. Crops well and keeps extremely well. Skin colour: Green skin ripening to yellow covered by a crimson flush.			
Type: Dessert Fruit size: Medium Picking time: Mid September Period of use: September - November	Gala (Pollination group: D). One of the most popular supermarket varieties, Gala apples are very crispy, sweet and mild in flavour. A good variety for juicing. Skin colour: Red with a portion of green or yellow stripes.			
Type: Culinary Fruit size: Medium – large Picking time: Mid August Period of use: August - Sep	3 Grenadier (Pollination group: B). This is the standard early cooking apple seen on the greengrocer's shelves. Skin colour: Yellowish - green.			
Type: Dessert Fruit size: Medium Picking time: Early September Period of use: Sept - October	4 James Grieve (Pollination group: B). Crops heavily and regularly, and a soft textured fruit is both juicy and tangy. Skin colour: Yellow, speckled and striped with orange.

Perhaps the most widely grown of all late dessert varieties. The flowers have average frost resistance and the fruit stores well. A little too vigorous for a small garden. Skin colour: Greenish - yellow, flushed with dark red. Patches of russet.			
Type: Culinary Fruit size: Large Picking time: Late September Period of use: October - December	Lord Derby (Pollination group: C). Succeeds in cold and wet areas and has good disease resistance. Thin the fruit in June for the best sized apples. Skin colour: Green.

Type: Dessert Fruit size: Medium Picking time: Early October Period of use: Nov - January	4 Spartan (Pollination Group: B). The smooth skinned red fruit is white fleshed, crisp and very juicy. The hardy tree yields moderately well and spurs freely. Thinning is essential if there is an abundance of fruitlets. Skin Colour: Yellow, almost entirely flushed with dark red.

Property

Complaints

Any complaint should be made on arrival of the consignment and no later than seven days after delivery and confirmed in writing. All goods are dispatched at purchaser's risk.
